ur extensive Extra Curricular Programme is literally bursting at the seams each term. We have a broad and balanced range of clubs available to all pupils.

Playground pals and road safety club have both been a big hit this year. Our science club is great fun with pupils doing experiments in the senior labs. There are Art and Craft Clubs for all year groups, sewing club, Eco Group, Gardening Club, Cooking Club, Christian Union, Maths Challenge, IT Club, a huge variety of Music Groups, Ballet, French Club, Mandarin Club and we even offer a Ukulele club!

Our Foundation Stage children have been working really hard in gymnastics and dance, exploring different movements and improving their basic strength, flexibility and coordination. They thoroughly enjoyed showing off their skills to all the mums and dads at Sports Day.

The Year 1 and 2 pupils have also been working well in gymnastics and dance and have begun to show a good basic understanding of games such as football and tennis.

We were again the most represented team there by far, with each month over 90 pupils taking part – amazing! Without the fantastic support of the parents this would not be possible. - Thank you.'

Orienteering has featured highly both during the curriculum and extra curricular. Making the most of our wonderful grounds, the Junior pupils have all experienced using a map to navigate their way around the school. Some children even managed to qualify and compete at the British School Orienteering Championships. We were even more







thrilled when Charlie Rennie came in first, gaining the title of the Under 10 Great British Orienteering Champion.

We have completed yet another year of competitive **Gymnastics**, winning 3 team gold medals and going through to the County Finals again at Uppingham. The take up for Gym Club has been overwhelming again this year. Every child who attended the club had the opportunity to participate in a gym competition at school. It was a great opportunity for parents to see how their child has been getting on and the progress that had been made, both in curriculum time and in the club.


